From the Village Clerk/Treasurer:

We are reaching the end of another year, and as always, our goal is to balance the General Fund, where we pay bills and salaries. We started the year with \$2,259,156.00 in our General Fund, and after closing the books on November, we currently have \$2,608,441.00, an increase of \$349,285.00. We need the end of the year number to be larger or equal to the beginning number in order to balance our General Fund, which it is, but we have one more month in 2012.

Our RITA revenue has increased. Through the end of November, we have seen a 7.69% increase in revenue compared to last year, but our first payment in December was considerably less than expected, and we will probably show a decrease in revenue for December. We are seeing a slow improvement, yet we need to be very cautious, because many outside influences in industry can impact this number.

This Administration and Council have tried very hard to continue the projects and programs that will make our Village a better place to live, to improve the infrastructure within our boundaries, and maintain the Village buildings, while keeping a balanced General Fund. Like our households, emergencies continue to pop up which makes every month a struggle financially, but we have adjusted and continue to be sustainable financially.

Again this year, we have paid down the debt on our Police Station by \$500,000.00. Currently, we owe \$1,500,000.00, and our plan is to have it paid off by 2015.

In early January, we will close the books on 2012, and I will be able to give everyone a better picture of where we are financially, but I believe at this time our finances are stable and secure.

If you have any questions or concerns, my door is always open.

Village Bus

The Village bus operates on a weekly basis for our senior citizens; a schedule of the monthly bus run is published with the Village Newsletter. We ask that all residents be responsible for cleaning up after their dog. We also ask dog owners who get their grass cut by the Village to do the same as well; it makes it easier to cut your grass. Snow Removal Program

Residential Snow Removal Program for our 2012/2013 season.

- All Village roadways will be plowed first and maintained prior to any driveways being plowed.
- Once the Service Director feels that the roadways and municipal buildings have been maintained, the driveways of our **senior citizens** will be plowed (using the same criteria that applies to our grass cutting service).
- Afterwards, taking into consideration manpower, time and safety issues the Village will **help** residents with their driveways in the event of a storm that produces more than 2-4 inches of snow at the resident's request.
- All residents must have driveway markers in place in order to allow the Service Department to plow their driveway. The Village will provide markers and place them for all seniors who qualify for the "grass cutting program." Residents with shorter driveways need 4 markers in place, and long driveways must have 6 markers. They need to be placed at the beginning, middle(if long drive), and at the end of your drive. If you wish to purchase markers from the Village for \$1 each, please stop at the Service Department. Should you have any questions please contact Service Director, Scott Waldemarson at 216-641-3505.

Please note that residents are responsible to clean their driveway aprons, as it is difficult to plow them over again after the streets are plowed. Each homeowner and/or resident must have a waiver of liability on file at our Service Department. If you already have filled out a waiver of liability and there have been no changes to it, there will be no need to fill out a new one.

Recycling Program

We have relocated the Cardboard Recycling container to the back of Bacci Park in the parking area near the playground!

To enter Bacci Park you must now enter using the new Rails to Trails entrance, which is located on the west of the Service Gargae. The original entrance on the east side of the Service Garage will only access the MetroParks parking area.

Holiday Home Safety & Crime Prevention

The holiday season is a busy and exciting time for all. Unfortunately, it is also a time when people can become careless in protecting their homes from holiday crime and nothing can ruin your holiday faster than becoming a victim of crime.

The following tips can help you enjoy the holiday without incident.

- Be extra careful about locking doors and windows when leaving your home, even for a few minutes.
- Don't openly display gifts in view of the front window, tempting a thief to "smash and grab".
- Leave a radio or TV on so the home appears to be occupied.
- When leaving for an extended period of time, don't advertise! Have a neighbor or family pick up your newspapers and mail.
- Use auto-timers on indoor and outdoor lights.
- Don't leave messages on your answering machine or posts on social media (i.e. Facebook or Twitter) that you are out of town.
- Don't leave keys near the door (i.e. under rocks, flower pots, or above door ledges). Instead, leave the key with a trusted neighbor or family member.
- It is also not uncommon for criminals to take advantage of the generosity of the holiday spirit by soliciting donations from door to door for a non-existent charity. Donate only to a recognized charitable organization of your choosing.
- "Help us, help you!" Contact the police with any suspicious activity.

Fire Department:

Holiday and Christmas Tree Fire Safety

Decorating homes and businesses is a long-standing tradition around the holiday season. Unfortunately, these same decorations may increase your chances of fire.

Following a few simple fire safety tips can keep electric lights, candles and the ever popular Christmas tree from creating a tragedy.

- Don't put your live Christmas tree up too early or leave it up for longer than two weeks.
- Place trees away from heat sources, including fireplaces or heat vents.

 The heat will dry out the tree, causing it to be more easily ignited by heat, flame or sparks.
- Keep the live tree stand filled with water at all times.
- Use only nonflammable decorations.
- Don't link more than three light strands, unless the directions indicate it's safe. Connect strings of lights to an extension cord before plugging the cord into the outlet.
- Avoid using lit candles; consider using battery-operated flameless candles, which can look, smell and feel like real candles.
- Ensure that Christmas trees and other holiday decorations don't block an exit way.

Suggestions for Slowing Global Warming

Building Department:



ATTENTION ALL DWELLING OWNERS AND DWELLING OCCUPANTS:

- 1. Beginning in March/April of next year (2013) all exterior dwelling units, dwelling structures, and residential premises shall be inspected relative to compliance with our Village Building & Housing Code Chapter 1490.14. Violations shall be processed to dwelling owners and dwelling occupants identifying items of violation and a fixed time to correct these items that will be listed. Civil action and/or penalties shall apply for non-compliance.
- 2. Rental property owners shall require interior and exterior inspection whenever:
 - a. An ownership change occurs.
 - b. A tenant change occurs.

An occupancy certificate must be issued to the home owner prior to occupancy. Chapter 1492.25. Please be advised that it is the homeowners responsibility to obtain an "application for a rental certificate" for the home he or she owns located in the Village of Cuyahoga Heights.

3. Out of county dwelling owners shall register annually with the Building Department pursuant to Chapter 1492.26. Application forms are available online at www.cuyahogaheights.com or at the Building Department.
