West Side Market

As we noted last month, several residents asked if we would bring back the bus trips to the West Side Market. Our first trip is scheduled for Saturday, August 3. As in past practice, trips will be scheduled for the first Saturday of the month. The village van will pick up residents at their home beginning at 7:45 a.m. (*the market opens at 8:00 a.m.*) and shoppers will have a couple of hours to enjoy all the market has to offer. The van will then depart the market around 10:15 a.m. to bring you back to your residence. Residents must register by calling the Village Hall no later than 3:00 p.m. on Friday, the day before the trip. Please note that children 15 years of age and younger must be accompanied by an adult and there is a \$5.00 non-resident fee.



Kelleys Island

My annual trip to Kelleys Island with our village resident senior citizens (60 years of age and older) takes place on Monday, August 26. If you're not a member of our senior citizens organization and haven't signed up for the trip at their monthly meeting, you can contact Lee Ann at the village hall during normal business hours for further information. Deadline to register is Monday, August 5.



Flu Shots

In cooperation with Independence Discount Drug Mart, Nurse Socausky and my office—we will again be offering flu shots to our village senior residents (60 years of age and older) on Friday, September 13 at Klima Gardens. So that we can safely manage the event, blood work appointments will begin at 8:30 a.m. in 10-minute increments; flu shots will begin at 9:00 a.m. in 3-minute increments. As a reminder, if you plan on getting blood work, please do not eat or drink anything except water, after midnight the night before. Flu shots and blood work will strictly be by appointment only. **Deadline to register is Thursday, August 29.** Please contact Lee Ann at the village hall during normal business hours to make an appointment.



Drug Mart will provide us with registration forms which we will drop off at your home prior to your appointment. You will need to fill it out and bring it with you on the day of your appointment. We will again be serving a warm breakfast for our senior citizens, packaged in individual containers, so you can either eat it at Klima's or take it home with you. If you are 65 years of age or older, please bring your Medicare Card as we will seek Medicare payment for qualifying seniors. Our village will pay for flu shots for our village senior residents and employees just like we've done in the past.

OHIO MUNICIPAL INCOME TAX

UNDERSTANDING ESTIMATED PAYMENTS

As with both the Federal Income Tax and Ohio's Individual Income Tax, the Municipal Income Tax may require taxpayers to make estimated payments during each tax year.

Estimated payments may be required if you have:

- Taxable income in an Ohio municipality that is not subject to withholding,
- Business income in an Ohio municipality,
- And/or if you owe residence tax to the municipality where you reside.

Ohio law requires you to make estimated municipal income tax payments if you will owe \$200.00 or more to an Ohio municipality. If your estimated tax payments are not 90% of the tax due or not equal to or greater than your prior year's total tax liability, you may be subject to penalty and interest.

How to Estimate Your Municipal Income Tax:

RITA's [Quick Tax Calc](#) tool provides taxpayers with a simple, quick tax calculation to compute effective tax rates and potential tax withholdings.

[Quick Tax Calc](#) performs this calculation using either taxpayer estimated annual wages/W-2 or most recent paystub.



Estimated Tax Payment Due Dates:

Estimated payments are due quarterly:

1st Quarter - April 15th *

2nd Quarter - June 15th

3rd Quarter - September 15th

4th Quarter - January 15th

** This date usually coincides with the annual income tax return filing deadline, and may change from year to year if the filing deadline is extended due to weekends and/or a legal holiday*

Penalties for Not Filing Municipal Income Taxes

As applicable, penalties and interest will be charged for:

- Unpaid Tax
- Late Filing Penalty
- Interest on Unpaid Tax

STRANGER DANGER



Schools out and so are the kids. Learn how you can teach your child to be alert and stay safe this summer.

While still one of the core lessons of childhood safety, the “Stranger Danger” lesson can use some updates.

Unfortunately (and all too often) it’s not strangers that pose the risk – and kids don’t always know they are in danger.

Some Basic Facts:

Stranger abductions are rare. Your children are much more likely to be abducted or abused by someone they know.

That’s why teaching stranger danger simply doesn’t cut it. Tell your children that no one should hurt them or touch their private parts – even people they know.

Your children are much more likely to be sexually abused than abducted and more often than not – by someone you have deemed safe. Teach your child to notice the warning signs of sexual abuse.

Learn how to spot when someone is grooming your child for abuse.

Tips For Parents

THROW OUT YOUR CHILD’S PERSONALIZED CLOTHING BACKPACKS AND LUNCH BOXES.

When strangers know your child’s name – your child is much more likely to trust them. Don’t make it easy for a stranger by plastering your children’s names all over their bodies.

HAVING A CODE WORD IS USEFUL IN MANY SCENARIOS

Make up a family code word. Try not to use a common word – but don’t pick something that is so bizarre it is hard to use naturally. You can use the code word in the following ways:

- If you send someone to pick up your child – they should know the code word. As I talked about earlier, our kids are more likely to be sexually abused by someone they know. If the person doesn’t know the code word – your children shouldn’t go with them. **No matter what.**
- If your children are at a friend’s house and something is making them feel unsafe, they can call you and use the code word.
- If you are in public and there is a safety threat – you can use the word to warn your children to exit quickly or get down.

Make up a **code word** with your children.

Teach them to use it when they are away from you and in an unsafe situation.

When you hear the code word, immediately go get them.

Tips for Kids

DEFINE AND EXPLAIN WHAT A "STANGER" IS

- Teach your child that anyone your child doesn't know – is a stranger. Ask them what they think a stranger looks like and then correct any misperceptions. Children often think a person is only unsafe if they have a rough appearance. Telling kids simply to not talk to strangers doesn't help.
- It is more important to highlight that no matter what a stranger says (candy, puppy, etc.) they should never **leave** or get into a car with them. Role-play these ideas with your kids. Use various scenarios to test them.
- Teach your kids to trust their gut instincts.



IF FOLLOWED, RUN IN THE OPPOSITE DIRECTION OF THE CAR

- Tell your children that if they are being followed or chased start running in the opposite direction of the car. This can buy them some time as the car turns around.

WHEN IN TROUBLE – LOOK FOR A MOM WITH KIDS

- Desperate times call for desperate measures. Tell your children that if they are lost or are feeling unsafe – find a mom with kids. Helping them delineate who might be safe beforehand can save critical seconds when they are in danger. Please keep in mind that just because a "mom is with kids" doesn't necessarily make them safe. But in an emergency beggars can't always be choosers!

TEACH YOUR CHILDREN TO SCREAM, "WHO ARE YOU?"

- How many times have you seen kids struggling in an adult's arms and walked past them? Kids have tantrums all the time and we are immune to them. Teach your children to scream out things that would alarm others, like:



TEACH YOUR KIDS TO BE DESTRUCTIVE IN ORDER TO DRAW ATTENTION

- Tell your children that if a stranger tries to take them – all manners are out the window. Tell them that they are allowed to hit, scream and make a scene.
- Give them some suggestions. If they are in a store, tell them to knock things off the shelf. Knocking things over will get the attention of more people who will then take a closer look at what is going on.

You might think all this talk about doom and gloom is unnecessary. You might think that the chances are so small it isn't even worth talking about. You are correct the chances are small, but what you teach may be the difference between the life and death of a child...

It is indeed worth it!!!

Fireworks Safety



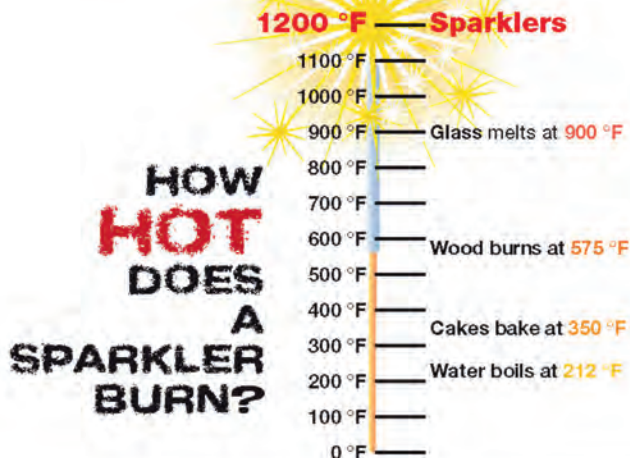
FIREWORKS are often used to mark special events and holidays. The only safe way to view fireworks is to attend a professional show. It is important to know that **fireworks are not safe in the hands of consumers**. Fireworks cause thousands of injuries each year.

A few ideas to get into the patriotic spirit, without fireworks:

1. Use glow sticks, they glow in the dark and are a safe alternative to a sparkler. Fun for all ages.
2. Loud and proud. Noise makers are sure to make a statement. They can be found at local party supply stores or make your own.
3. Outdoor movie night. Set up a screen and projector. Don't forget the bugspray!
4. Red, white and blue silly string...fun for all ages.
5. Make a patriotic craft with the family.
6. Throw a birthday party for the USA, and don't forget the cake.

FACTS

- ! More than 19,500 reported fires are started by fireworks annually.
- ! Burns account for 44% of the 9,100 injuries treated in emergency rooms seen in the month around July 4.
- ! Half of the fireworks injuries seen at emergency rooms were extremities: hand, finger, or leg. One-third were to the eye or other parts of the head.
- ! Children ages 10-14 had the highest rate of fireworks injury, with more than one-third (36%) of the victims of fireworks injuries under age 15.
- ! Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries.

Garbage Pick Up - Recycling - Yard Waste

Our service department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. They will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.



Special Pick Up - **NOW ONLINE!**

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, you can now go online to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must submit your information by 4:00 p.m. on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up. Please visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Special Pick Up' tab. Please fill out your name, address, and all information regarding items you would like to be picked up and where they are located. You will then get an email response when the request has been successfully submitted. **If you have any questions, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505.**



Charity Pick Up - **NOW ONLINE!**

Our service department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service. Please visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Charity Pick Up' tab. Please enter your address and select from the drop down. Fill out your name, phone number, email address and all information regarding items you would like to donate and where items are located. This must be submitted prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service. You will then get an email response when the request has been successfully submitted. **If you have any questions, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505.**



Dumpsters - **NOW ONLINE!**

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items NOT including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not mix materials. Please visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Dumpster Rental' tab. Provide your information and select a preferred delivery date for the dumpster & specify the location for placement. You can now conveniently pay the fee online through a link that will be sent to your email. You also can drop off cash or check payments at village hall. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.



Table & Chair Rental

A limited number of tables and chairs are available for use by residents having parties at their residence, free of charge. Please contact the service department at 216-641-3505 to reserve your tables and chairs and to arrange a time when you can pick them up.

Pest and Insect Control

Pest control services are available by contacting our service department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem. We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering your home.



Meals on Wheels (By Lori's Custom Catering) – **NOW ONLINE!**

Visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Meals On Wheels' tab to fill out an application. This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunchtime meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our service department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (*you must sign-up up for a full week.*) To receive meals for a given week, payment must be made by the Thursday prior. **If you have any questions regarding this service, please contact Vera at the service department at 216-641-3505 or sd@cuyahogaheights.com.**



Tree Trimming/Removal Service – **NOW ONLINE!**

The village will provide a professional tree trimmer to remove or trim a tree on a resident's property. Please note that tree trimming/removal is limited to two (2) trims per year and one (1) removal. If a crane is needed for tree removal, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for the service. In addition, if a stump needs ground, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for this service, whether the homeowner uses the tree company that the village has a contract with or another tree company. Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our village has a recycling container located at Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Please make sure to break down your cardboard boxes before placing them in the container. Stop on down and do your part in recycling. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the service department during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.



Grass Cutting – **NOW ONLINE!**

The village will mow the lawns of senior citizens aged 60 and above who meet the program's criteria at their residences. A signed waiver is required before we can provide this service. You can access the forms online or return them to the village hall. If you are unsure whether you have a waiver on file, please reach out to the service department at 216-641-3505. Please remember to remove dog droppings on a routine basis.
