## Around Town

Save the date for our annual Easter egg hunt which will take place on Saturday, April 12 at 11:30 a.m. The egg hunt is open to all Cuyahoga Heights' resident children and grandchildren 0-12 years of age. Additional information will be included in the next newsletter.

We invite our residents to honor departed family members through the planting of a memorial tree as we celebrate Arbor Day on Friday, April 25 at 5:30 p.m. at Bacci Park. Village residents may purchase a tree through the village for \$200 which includes your choice of a tree (*White Oak, Red Oak, Norway Maple, Green Mountain, Sugar Maple, Red Maple, Crimson King or Black Gum*), its planting and initial maintenance, and a memorial plaque. For those residents interested in purchasing a tree, the application along with payment must be turned into the village hall c/o Lee Ann by Friday, March 14. Applications are available at the village hall or on our website.



Trips to the market are scheduled the first Saturday of each month. Upcoming dates for this year are as follows: March 1, April 5 and May 3. Trips will be suspended for the summer months and then commence in September. Our village van will pick up residents at their home beginning at 7:45 a.m. (the market opens at 8:00 a.m.) and shoppers will have a couple of hours to shop. 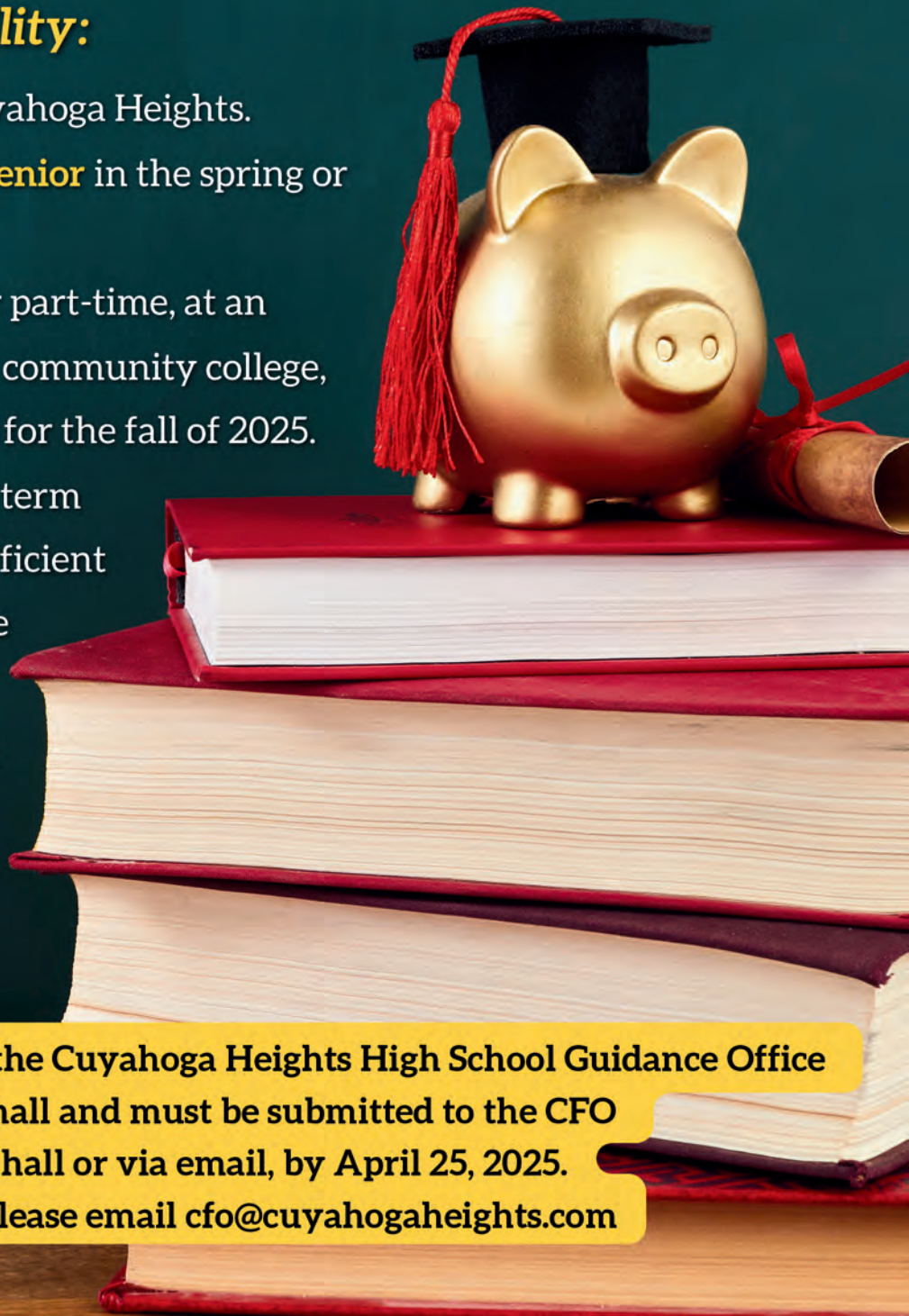

# 2025 Village Scholarship Program

Our scholarship program assists village resident graduates. Recipients will be awarded a \$1,000 scholarship in the form of a tuition reimbursement.

## Requirements for eligibility:

1. **Be a resident** of Village of Cuyahoga Heights.
2. **Be a graduating high school senior** in the spring or summer of 2025.
3. **Be enrolled** either full-time or part-time, at an accredited college, university, community college, vocational or technical school for the fall of 2025.
4. **Complete** the fall 2025 school term with a grade point average sufficient to be in good standing with the academic institution.
5. **Must submit proof of grades** to the CFO's office by March 1, 2026.

# Winter Fun on the Ice

With the extended cold temperatures, the Bacci Park Ponds, Erie Canal and Cuyahoga River can be inviting spots for those that enjoy winter sports such as skating, snowshoeing and fishing. Even in bitter cold temperatures, ice conditions on bodies of water can be extremely uncertain.

Ice found on natural bodies of water raises the risk of danger due to natural variables. There is no way to judge the strength and safety of ice by looking at it or by the temperature of the day. Fluctuating temperatures, exposure to sunlight and other factors affect the consistency of the ice. It can be several inches thick in one spot and only an inch thick 10 feet away. Be especially wary of ice covered with snow. Snow can hide cracks and weaknesses in open ice. Parents should educate their children about the danger of going out onto a frozen body of water, including never following a friend or a pet into these potential danger zones.



## Basic Tips

- Parents should always supervise children skating or playing on or near ice. Educate them on the risks of playing on ice, and outfit them with life jackets. Never leave children alone on or near ice covered bodies of water.
- Adults should prepare before going on ice. Wait to walk out onto ice until there is a minimum of four inches of clear, solid ice measured from multiple locations. Start measurements in an area where the water is shallow. If the thickness in the shallow area is less than three inches, do not walk on the ice.
- Take someone with you, wear a life jacket, and bring safety equipment, including a cell phone, in case of an emergency.
- Always keep your pets on a leash near frozen bodies of water. If a pet falls through the ice, do not attempt to rescue your pet, call 9-1-1 or go for help.
- Stay clear of white ice. White ice contains air and snow within it, therefore, making it weaker.
- **Stay off river ice.** Currents can quickly change the thickness of ice, making it more fragile.



## A MESSAGE FROM POLICE CHIEF, BRIAN STURGILL

### When Someone Falls Through the Ice

- If you come across someone who has fallen through the ice, don't attempt a rescue yourself. **Call 9-1-1** or immediately go for help. Local public safety officers have proper training and equipment to handle ice emergencies.
- If the ice does not support the victim's weight, it will not support yours. Avoid going onto the ice to attempt a rescue, but extend a ladder, rope, jumper cables, or tree branch to the victim along with something that will keep them afloat.
- Once the person is rescued from the cold water, help the victim into dry clothes as soon as possible. If dry clothes aren't an option, leave the wet clothes on for insulation to trap body heat.
- Transport the victim to get medical attention if necessary.

### If You Fall Through the Ice

- Remain calm and try not to panic. The body will undergo cold water shock when suddenly immersed in cold water, and you will experience an increase in heart rate and blood pressure.
- Face the direction you came from and spread your arms out on the unbroken ice. Kick your feet and try to pull yourself onto the ice.
- Once out of the cold water, remain lying on the ice (do not attempt to stand) to keep your weight distributed and avoid breaking through the ice. Roll away from the hole and crawl back to solid land. This keeps your weight distributed.
- Treat yourself for hypothermia and seek medical attention.

# FREEZE

on Winter Fires

Home fires occur more in winter than in any other season. As you stay cozy and warm this winter, be fire smart!



Half of all home heating fires occur in December, January and February.



Heating equipment is involved in **1 in every 6** home fires and **1 in every 5** home fire deaths.



Keep anything that can burn **at least 3 feet** from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators or space heaters.



Keep portable generators **outside, away from windows, and as far away** from your home as possible.



Install and test carbon monoxide alarms **at least once a month**.



Plug only **1 heat-producing appliance** (like a space heater) into an electrical outlet at a time.



Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney and vents **every year**.



Store cooled ashes in a tightly covered metal container, and keep it **outside at least 10 feet** from your home and any nearby buildings.

Looks like the cold winters are back, which leads to great opportunities to get all those interior projects going!

General redecorating, such as painting, wallpapering, new flooring, doors, trim work and new lighting do not require a construction permit. *However*, contractors hired for this type of work are required to be registered with the building department. Your contractor should be insured, this protects you as the homeowner and the village.

A homeowner may obtain a building permit to work on their established personal residence without registering as a contractor. However, if a homeowner plans to hire a contractor for all or part of the work, they must register with the village. Contractors must get a construction permit from the building department before starting a project to ensure their work is inspected for sound construction practices and in compliance with safety and zoning ordinances. The application for construction permit can be obtained through our website [www.cuyahogaheights.com](http://www.cuyahogaheights.com), under the online services tab at the top of the page.



Some examples of projects that require a permit include:

- Concrete work
- Electrical work
- Major plumbing work
- Hot water tank and furnace replacement
- A/C condenser replacement
- Roof replacement
- Finishing a basement
- Window and door replacement
- New or replacement fencing (property line needs to be surveyed)
- Complete house painting
- Swimming pools

Residents must submit drawings to the building department for review and approval for more complex projects, such as decks, complete basement remodels, garages and additions. If you are not sure your project requires a permit or what needs to be submitted, please call or come and see us at the building department and we will assist you with whatever is needed, 216-641-7020 Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m – 12:00 p.m. and 1:00- 4:30 p.m.



Permits- Work needs to begin within six months after the permit has been issued.

Permits expire one year after they have been issued.

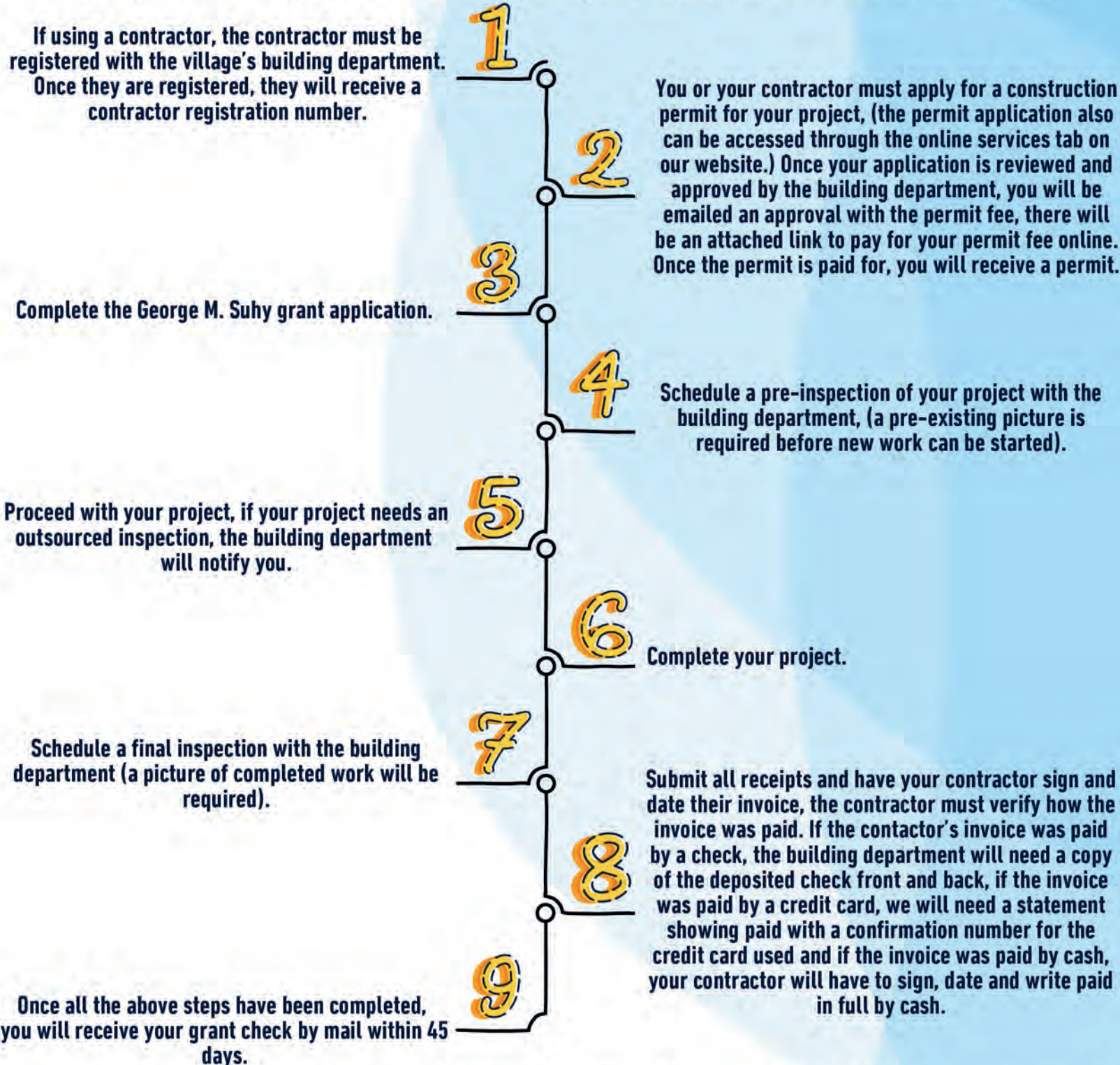

## Garbage Pick Up – Recycling – Yard Waste

Our service department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. They will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.



## Special Pick Up – **NOW ONLINE!**

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, you can now go online to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must submit your information by 4:00 p.m. on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up. Please visit [www.cuyahogaheights.com](http://www.cuyahogaheights.com) at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Special Pick Up' tab. Please fill out your name, address, and all information regarding items you would like to be picked up and where they are located. You will then get an email response when the request has been successfully submitted. **If you have any questions, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505.**



## Charity Pick Up – **NOW ONLINE!**

Our service department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service. Please visit [www.cuyahogaheights.com](http://www.cuyahogaheights.com) at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Charity Pick Up' tab. Please enter your address and select from the drop down. Fill out your name, phone number, email address and all information regarding items you would like to donate and where items are located. This must be submitted prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service. You will then get an email response when the request has been successfully submitted. **If you have any questions, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505.**



## Pest and Insect Control Service

**Pest control services are available by contacting our service department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem.** We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering your home.



## Tree Trimming/Removal Service – **NOW ONLINE!**

The Village will provide a professional tree trimmer to remove or trim a tree on a resident's property. Please note that tree trimming/removal is limited to two (2) trims per year and one (1) removal. If a crane is needed for tree removal, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for the service. In addition, if a stump needs ground, it is the responsibility of the homeowner to pay for this service, whether the homeowner uses the tree company that the Village has a contract with or another tree company. ## Meals on Wheels (By Lori's Custom Catering) - **NOW ONLINE!**

Visit [www.cuyahogaheights.com](http://www.cuyahogaheights.com) at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Meals On Wheels' tab to fill out an application. This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunchtime meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our service department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (*you must sign-up up for a full week.*) To receive meals for a given week, payment must be made by the Thursday prior. **If you have any questions regarding this service, please contact Vera at the service department at 216-641-3505 or [sd@cuyahogaheights.com](mailto:sd@cuyahogaheights.com).**



## Dumpster Rentals - **NOW ONLINE!**

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items NOT including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not mix materials. Please visit [www.cuyahogaheights.com](http://www.cuyahogaheights.com) at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Dumpster Rental' tab. Provide your information and select a preferred delivery date for the dumpster & specify the location for placement. You can now conveniently pay the fee online through a link that will be sent to your email. You also can drop off cash or check payments at village hall. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.



## Table & Chair Rental

A limited number of tables and chairs are available for use by residents having parties at their residence, free of charge. Please contact the service department at 216-641-3505 to reserve your tables and chairs and to arrange a time when you can pick them up.



## Newspaper/Cardboard Recycling

Do your part in helping the environment; recycle cardboard and newspaper. Our village has a recycling container located at Bacci Park in the rear of the back parking lot. The container is strictly for cardboard and newspaper. Please make sure to break down your cardboard boxes before placing them in the container. Stop on down and do your part in recycling. If you have a large amount and are unable to take it to the container, please call the service department during normal business hours prior to Tuesday mornings; we will put it on our "special pick up" list.



## Equipment Loans

*In previous years, the service department has provided equipment loans to residents, including plumber's snakes for unclogging drains. However, moving forward, the service department will discontinue this practice. **If you experience an emergency, please reach out to the service department, and we will assess whether we can assist you immediately or if we can recommend any vendors to help with blocked drains.***



# Residential Snow Removal Program

*The village offers snow removal service performed by our service department to our residents during the winter months. If any resident is interested, please read for details on how to sign up.*

- All village roadways will be plowed first and maintained prior to any driveways being plowed.
- Once the service director feels that the roadways and municipal buildings have been maintained, the driveways of our senior citizens will be plowed (using the same criteria that applies to our grass cutting service).
- Afterwards, taking into consideration manpower, time and safety issues, the village will help residents with their driveways in the event of a storm that produces more than 2-4 inches of snow at the resident's request.
- All residents must have driveway markers in place in order to allow the service department to plow their driveway. The village will provide markers and place them for all seniors who qualify for the "grass cutting program." Residents with shorter driveways need 4 markers in place, and long driveways must have 6 markers. They need to be placed at the beginning, middle (if long drive), and at the end of your drive. If you wish to purchase markers from the village for \$1 each, please stop at the service department. Should you have any questions please contact Service Director, Dave Sammons at 216-641-3505.

*Please note that residents are responsible for cleaning their driveway aprons, as it is difficult to plow them over again after the streets are plowed. Each homeowner and/or resident must have a waiver of liability on file at our service department. If you already have filled out a waiver of liability and there have been no changes to it, there will be no need to fill out a new one.*
