Programs

Start the New Year off right—join the Seven Hills Recreation Center. Since 2018, our village entered into an agreement with the City of Seven Hills so that our residents could take advantage of their recreation facility. Our village will pay 100% of the rate for bona fide village residents that are 62-years of age and older, U.S. Veterans, and disabled residents. In addition, the village will pay 50% of the rate for all other bona fide village residents desiring to secure a membership as outlined in our price sheet. In order to purchase a membership, please contact the village hall during normal business hours. Each resident/family must show proof that he/she is a bona fide resident of the Village of Cuyahoga Heights. At that time, you will also need to pay your 50% of the membership (cash or check only) for those not covered under the 100% rate. A copy of the approved application, along with rules and regulations will then be given to the resident. It is then up to the resident to take the approved application to the Seven Hills Recreation Center so that you can receive your official pass. We hope our residents continue to take advantage of this special offer, as well as keeping healthy and fit.



Our administration is pleased to announce that we have renewed our contract with the Heritage Home program for 2025. If your home is 50 years old or older, a one-, two-, or three-family home, you can receive technical assistance and may qualify for a low-interest rehabilitation loan. The loan can be used for numerous interior and exterior projects that can make your home more comfortable while preserving architectural character. West Side Market Trips

Trips to the market are scheduled the first Saturday of each month. With that being said, the dates are as follows for 2025: January 4; February 1; March 1; April 5 and May 3. Trips will be suspended for the summer months and then commence in September. Our village van will pick up residents at their home beginning at 7:45 a.m. (the market opens at 8:00 a.m.) and shoppers will have a couple of hours to shop. The van will then depart the market around 10:15 a.m. to bring you back to your residence. Residents must register by calling the village hall no later than 3:00 p.m. on Friday, the day before the trip. Please note that children 15 years of age and younger must be accompanied by an adult and there is a \$5.00 non-resident fee.

Residents can purchase a book for \$10 (cash or check only); however, only (1) book to each residence. In addition, books are available to non-residents at \$50 per book + shipping and handling, if it needs to be shipped. This will assist you with your preparation of tax documents as tax season is now upon us!

If you are new to the community or online system for RITA Taxing Agency, It is your responsibility to keep your primary email address up to date so that RITA can communicate with you electronically. You understand and agree that if RITA sends you an electronic communication, but you do not receive it because your primary email address on file is incorrect, out of date, blocked by your service provider, or you are otherwise unable to receive electronic communications, RITA will be deemed to have provided the communication to you.

Please note that if you use a spam filter that blocks or re-routes emails from senders not listed in your email address book, you must add RITA to your email address book so that you will be able to receive the communications we send to you.

GAMBLING

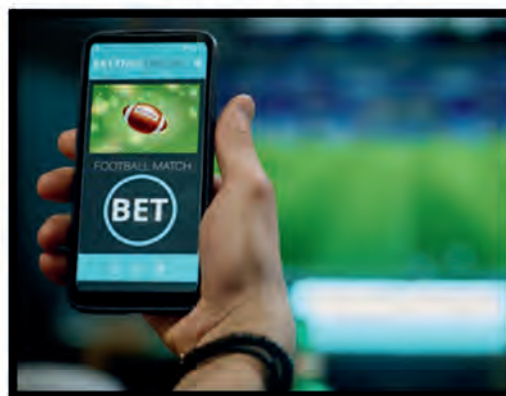
The risks of placing bets online and being responsible.

The early months of each year are an exciting time for sports fans and people who like to gamble, with the NFL playoffs/Superbowl, NCAA Bowl Games, NBA and NHL Finals and, of course, March Madness. Betting on sporting events can bring excitement with the possibility of financial reward and loss and cybersecurity risks.

With any seasonal, popular, or hot topic in the news, sporting events have become a prime target for spammers and bad actors. It might be sharing insider information on injuries, the latest upset, or a new deal, bad actors will leverage any headline that might be considered popular to get users to click on a link or open a document. Untrustworthy sites will even mimic popular sporting and betting sites to get people to click on a link and share their personal and financial information.

So, what can you do to protect yourself?

- Only use trustworthy online gambling sites that have good cybersecurity and privacy practices, such as enforcing strong passwords, multi-factor authentication, and more
- Only go to known and trustworthy news sites
- Use strong and unique passwords
- Review the privacy terms of online gambling sites before using them
- Watch out for phishing emails and spam
- If you're using an app, make sure you have installed the latest software updates
- Keep your devices and firewalls up to date with antivirus and advanced threat protection
- Set up monitoring and alerts on your banking accounts
- Educate yourself, your organization, family, and loved ones on the cyber risks
- Set up internet filters to block traffic to online gambling sites



Sporting events are exciting, and many feel that betting on the events heightens the experience. But don't let the thrill of the game or the win cause you to lose—to a cyber incident.

TIPS

for RESPONSIBLE GAMBLING

If you do choose to gamble, there are some things you can do to reduce the chances of developing a gambling disorder. Implementing these strategies can help you keep gambling a fun, exciting, and manageable form of entertainment.

- Expect to lose.
- Avoid gambling when angry, lonely, stressed, depressed, or upset.
- Don't "chase" your losses by making bigger bets to win back the money you have lost.
- Don't think of gambling as a way to make money, but rather as an enjoyable form of entertainment performed in moderation.
- Set money and time limits for gambling and stick to them.
- Don't use your credit cards or borrow money to gamble.
- Don't gamble under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- Take regular breaks from gambling and engage in other enjoyable forms of entertainment.
- Educate yourself about problem gambling.

Carbon Monoxide Safety



Often called the invisible killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

- CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- Choose a CO alarm that is listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel declare that it is safe to re-enter the home.
- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.
- Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO — only use outside.

HOME HEATING EQUIPMENT



Have fuel-burning heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in. When using a fireplace, open the flue for adequate ventilation. Never use your oven to heat your home.

- ❗ A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time.
- ❗ In 2010, U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated 80,100 non-fire CO incidents in which carbon monoxide was found, or an average of nine calls per hour.

Happy New Year!

Just a quick update on the George M. Suhy Grant Program:

We are on the third year of the new five-year program that was approved by council. The new cycle for the grant program started January 1, 2023, and will expire December 31, 2027. Every property owner in the village is eligible for up to three grants totaling \$6,000.00 in the five-year period.

If your home improvement project is eligible for the George M. Suhy grant program, you can use all \$6,000.00 on one project or break it up into two or three projects. Once your \$6,000.00 in grant money has been used in the five-year period, you will not be eligible for another grant until 2028.

Also available is our senior/disability grant, this grant would cover walk-in showers, stair lifts, handrails, wheelchair ramps, grab bars throughout your home and any home improvements that would assist you with a disability or the ability to move more freely throughout your home.

The senior/disability grant program started on January 1, 2023, and will expire on December 31, 2027. The grant program is for three grants totaling \$3,000.00, each grant is for a maximum of \$1,000.00, so any invoice up to \$2,000.00 you will receive half of the amount. You have three grants available for three separate projects.

The George M. Suhy Grant Program

The process is now done online through our website at www.cuyahogaheights.com, click on the online services tab at the top of the page and scroll down to Suhy grant application. This is where you will start your application for your grant. Please follow the steps listed below:

- 1**

If using a contractor, the contractor must be registered with the village's building department. Once they are registered, they will receive a contractor registration number.
- 2**

You or your contractor must apply for a construction permit for your project, (the permit application also can be accessed through the online services tab on our website.) Once your application is reviewed and approved by the building department, you will be emailed an approval with the permit fee, there will be an attached link to pay for your permit fee online. Once the permit is paid for, you will receive a permit.
- 3**

Complete the George M. Suhy grant application.
- 4**

Schedule a pre-inspection of your project with the building department, (a pre-existing picture is required before new work can be started).
- 5**

Proceed with your project, if your project needs an outsourced inspection, the building department will notify you.
- 6**

Complete your project.
- 7**

Schedule a final inspection with the building department (a picture of completed work will be required).
- 8**

Submit all receipts and have your contractor sign and date their invoice, the contractor must verify how the invoice was paid. If the contractor's invoice was paid by a check, the building department will need a copy of the deposited check front and back, if the invoice was paid by a credit card, we will need a statement showing paid with a confirmation number for the credit card used and if the invoice was paid by cash, your contractor will have to sign, date and write paid in full by cash.
- 9**

Once all the above steps have been completed, you will receive your grant check by mail within 45 days.

Please note: If you do not have access to a computer, please call the building department and we can schedule a time when you can come into the village hall, and we will assist you in filling the application out on a village computer. Please call 216-641-7020 to schedule with the building department Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. and 1:00-4:30 p.m.

Garbage Pick Up – Recycling – Yard Waste

Our service department collects garbage every Monday morning beginning at 8:00 a.m. at no charge to its residents. They will come into your yard and take your garbage tote and recycling container to the curb; afterwards they will carry it back into your yard. Please note that if a holiday falls on a Monday; the service will commence on Tuesday.



Special Pick Up – **NOW ONLINE!**

If you need a special pick up for trash that is oversized, large amounts, or hazardous waste, you can now go online to be put on the special pick up list. Special pick up day is on Tuesday mornings, unless there is a holiday on Monday, at which time, the special pick up will be taken care of on Wednesday. You must submit your information by 4:00 p.m. on Monday to get on the list for Tuesday's pick up. Please visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Special Pick Up' tab. Please fill out your name, address, and all information regarding items you would like to be picked up and where they are located. You will then get an email response when the request has been successfully submitted. **If you have any questions, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505.**



Charity Pick Up – **NOW ONLINE!**

Our service department will pick up any small usable item at your residence that you would like to donate to charity on the first Wednesday of each month. Small household items, clothes, etc., are collected and donated. No tax receipts are given for this service. Please visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Charity Pick Up' tab. Please enter your address and select from the drop down. Fill out your name, phone number, email address and all information regarding items you would like to donate and where items are located. This must be submitted prior to the first Wednesday of the month for this service. You will then get an email response when the request has been successfully submitted. **If you have any questions, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505.**



Dumpsters – **NOW ONLINE!**

Residents may rent a village dumpster for personal use at their home by paying \$30.00 to the village for each dumpster load. Dumpsters can be used for yard waste, construction debris or miscellaneous household items NOT including carpet, tires, or hazardous waste. Please do not mix materials. Please visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Dumpster Rental' tab. Provide your information and select a preferred delivery date for the dumpster & specify the location for placement. You can now conveniently pay the fee online through a link that will be sent to your email. You also can drop off cash or check payments at village hall. Use of the dumpster is for a maximum of two (2) weeks. After two (2) weeks, the dumpster will be picked up from the resident's home. If the resident needs to use it again, he/she will go back on the waiting list. Please note that the disposal of debris created from outside the village is prohibited.

Pest and Insect Control

Pest control services are available by contacting our service department at 216-641-3505 with your name, address, phone number, and the nature of your problem. We will then reach out to our pest control vendor. This service is free except for termites, bed bugs, and wildlife. The village also sprays the outside of your home in the spring to hinder any unwanted pests from entering your home.



Meals on Wheels (By Lori's Custom Catering) – **NOW ONLINE!**

Visit www.cuyahogaheights.com at the top select 'Online Services' & select the red 'Meals On Wheels' tab to fill out an application. This service is available to any village resident that is 60 years of age or older. A lunchtime meal will be delivered to your home daily, Monday through Friday, by our service department. This is an affordable option, the cost is \$25.00 per week, which is only \$5.00 per day (*you must sign-up up for a full week.*) To receive meals for a given week, payment must be made by the Thursday prior. **If you have any questions regarding this service, please contact Vera at the service department at 216-641-3505 or sd@cuyahogaheights.com.**



Table & Chair Rental

A limited number of tables and chairs are available for use by residents having parties at their residence, free of charge. Please contact the service department at 216-641-3505 to reserve your tables and chairs and to arrange a time when you can pick them up.



Residential Snow Removal Program

- All village roadways will be plowed first and maintained prior to any driveways being plowed.
- Once the service director feels that the roadways and municipal buildings have been maintained, the driveways of our senior citizens will be plowed (using the same criteria that applies to our grass cutting service).
- Afterwards, taking into consideration manpower, time and safety issues, the village will help residents with their driveways in the event of a storm that produces more than 2-4 inches of snow at the resident's request.
- All residents must have driveway markers in place in order to allow the service department to plow their driveway. The village will provide markers and place them for all seniors who qualify for the "grass cutting program." Residents with shorter driveways need 4 markers in place, and long driveways must have 6 markers. They need to be placed at the beginning, middle (if long drive), and at the end of your drive. If you wish to purchase markers from the village for \$1 each, please stop at the service department. Should you have any questions please contact Service Director, Dave Sammons at 216-641-3505.
- Please note that residents are responsible for cleaning their driveway aprons, as it is difficult to plow them over again after the streets are plowed. Each homeowner and/or resident must have a waiver of liability on file at our service department. **If you already have filled out a waiver of liability and there have been no changes to it, there will be no need to fill out a new one. If you are unsure if you have one on file, please contact Vera at 216-641-3505 or sd@cuyahogaheights.com.**
